## Magic Valley Model Railroaders

The Magic Valley Model Railroaders is a 501 (c) (3) non-profit organization housed in the Railroad Building on the Twin Falls Country Fairgrounds. The club officially moved from a house-to-house model railroaders club to the fairgrounds in 1989 at the request of the then fair manager Cindy Demoney. We have grown into four active model railroads, G, O, HO and N scales. The club is comprised of volunteers who put in hours of work and funds to keep the trains moving.

Drop by the second Saturday of the month at noon to enjoy the trains, scenery and realism of the model railroads. And if you have a train you would like to run on one of our layouts, bring it out and give it a run on the rails.

### Here comes the fair! Here comes the fair!

As of this printing of the newsletter, there are only 59 days until the Twin Falls Country Fair opens. The very first fair was in 1916. And no there wasn't the Magic Valley Model Railroaders. This year will be exciting for us. We have made several improvements. The most noticeable will be the outside G Scale layout. Not only is it now easier to open and close but we will be providing shade to watch the trains roar by and we mean roar. Most of the locomotives are now wireless and have sound in them.

On the inside, the O Scale logging mountain is now complete and even has a logging train that circles the mountain and the crossing signal comes on automatically to warn the residents of the small village that the train is coming.

The HO Scale has a new farm scene to include the farmer working a plot of what appears to be some type of grass. The beet dump is filling up with the pile of beets growing. One of the farm houses even has an apple orchard behind the house.

N Scale now has a residential area. The unusual part of the area is most of the houses are not plastic or wood but printed from a computer printer and assembled. The detail is amazing. Check out the hospital that is a close replica of the one in Greely, Colorado where one of our modelers was born.

In addition to financially contributing plus purchasing materials and equipment for the club, our members contributed over 5,300 hours of time this past year to create new and keep all we have up and running. To help us continue to upgrade locomotives and rolling stock, upgrade track and create more scenery for your viewing pleasure we have a raffle at the fair each year. This year's raffle will be a 50/50 raffle. It is so hard to guess what would be popular with you for a raffle item so we selected one everyone seems to like; money, cold hard cash (or a cashier's check if you live out of the area). The project is now complete. Rather than having to move the panels to the caboose and bring them back, we can now simply raise them to show off the G Scale and the new "wireless" control system.

The wooden supports have been replaced with metal poles to hold the panels up. Come on out to see more of the G Scale and the new control system.

### Who owns all the trains that run?

As the club was developed in the beginning in the 70's and 80's, members went from home to home to run their personally owned equipment on each other's layouts. In 1989 the members were invited to consolidate in a facility at the county fairgrounds. The policy that members would run their own personal trains continued. It was not until 2016 that the club would have ownership in locomotives or rolling stock.

Today the policy that members run their trains on the club provided layouts continue. We do have rolling stock and locomotives that are club owned via donations on all scales. G scale has moved completely from the personally owned items to entirely club owned locomotives and stock. A vast majority of HO Scale is privately owned. N Scale has only one engine that is club owned. O Scale is half club and half personally owned equipment. All control and power equipment are club owned except for the O Scale which is on loan from a member until we can raise the funds and purchase a club owned control system.

Depending on the scale, locomotives cost from \$150 to in excess of \$700.

### Meet Tom Upchurch, O Scale

Tom joined the club in 2015. He was instrumental for construction of the current O Scale layout. Tom acquired his first Lionel train in 1946 and still has it today and it runs! While living in California, he owned and operated a hobby shop from 1996 until 2006 explaining his vast collection of buildings, accessories, locomotives and rolling stock. Tom is a "railfan" (meaning fan of the railroad) and has ridden several full-sized railroads. He is also a member of the Train Collectors Society and the Toy Train Operating Society. The greatest gift Tom brings to the club and those visiting is the role of conductor or engineer. Tom has put together a "conductor's" podium for the kids to announce the arrival and departure of trains. If the kids are so inclined, they may find themselves blowing the locomotive's horn to warn townsfolk of an incoming train. As the engineer, Tom has set up a live crane operation on the layout for kids to load a car with old rail. If you are an older kid, talk to Tom about joining the O Scale group to run trains. He would love to have you.
